Also present were Mayor James Damiano, Township Attorney Gerald Friend, Township Engineer Tom Lemanowicz, Township Administrator Charles Cuccia, Deputy Clerk Melissa DePiro and Township Clerk Cynthia Kraus.

ITEMS TO BE DISCUSSED: MAYOR/ADMINISTRATOR:

- 1. POLICE DIVISION TABLE OF ORGANIZATION ORDINANCE AMENDMENT Mayor Damiano explained the rationale of the Amendment of increasing the number of sergeants to nine, in order to ensure that the structure of the Police Department is maintained.
- 2. FEE ORDINANCE AMENDMENT Mayor Damiano stated the Amendment is an update to address the fees to as there have been many improvements throughout the Township.

Mayor Damiano announced that future meetings will be moved to the Zoom platform. The Mayor thanked the Council for the approval of the new, digital sign at the Recreation Center, and commented on the Pixellot system which allows residents to watch games without physically being present. Mayor Damiano discussed the past and upcoming snowstorms, and thanked the DPW for their hard work in clearing the roads and the Fire and Police Departments for responding to a recent fire in Town. He encouraged residents to clear fire hydrants near their homes. Due to the recent snowstorms, the Mayor has received phone calls from elderly residents concerning snow removal, prompting a potential new program, Snow Angels, whereby individuals help those who need assistance. Mayor Damiano highlighted the frustration of individuals attempting to obtain the COVID-19 vaccination, noting recent discussions regarding the concerns, and encouraged residents to continue to sign up and be patient. Lastly,

the Mayor reminded that the annual budget is being prepared for presentation at upcoming meetings, noting there will be shortfalls in various departments due the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

COUNCIL TOPICS FOR DISCUSSION

Councilmember KAHWATY commented on the Proclamation for Black History Month. He congratulated Mr. Minnella and his partner on their business. Councilmember KAHWATY thanked the DPW for their hard work to keep the residents safe during the storms. He encouraged residents to reach out to those who may need help as the circumstances of the recent storms in addition to the COVID-19 pandemic may increase situations of domestic violence.

Councilmember HABLITZ thanked the DPW for the amazing job in response to the snowstorms. She reminded residents that the Library is closed but continues to offer curbside pickup and many virtual events. In collaboration with Councilmember Seber and the Recreation Department, efforts to coordinate the Farmers Market are being done in preparation for 2021.

Councilmember VANCHERI thanked the Mayor for the Proclamation for Black History Month. He expressed his gratitude to the DPW for the tremendous amount of work done during the past few storms. He wished Mr. Minella and Mr. Zurcher much luck with their ownership of the Russian Hall. Councilmember VANCHERI provided an update on a meeting with the Police Chief regarding additional stop signs in the Township. Councilmember VANCHERI recounted his experience with the Mayor and the Fifth Grade Girl Scouts on a Zoom call on how the Township has become more environmentally friendly. In collaboration with the Council President, Mayor and Recreation Department, Councilmember VANCHERI discussed work conducted on the finalization of fees with the Recreation Center.

Councilmember SEBER stated the Open Space Committee had their first meeting and identified a short list of projects to be addressed at the monthly meetings. Councilmember Hablitz reported she and Councilmember SEBER were part of a Zoom meeting with the Daisies and Girl Scouts and discussed women in leadership. In response to Council President Sgobba, some items on the Open Space Committee short list include the Louis field area, refurbishing the playground and batting cage at the Recreation center, improvements at Wilmore park, and the Morris Canal area.

Council President SGOBBA reported his discussion with Ron Stell as the Clean Streets Coordinator and ways to keep the town clean in 2021. Though the Senior Advisory Committee has not been able to meet, phone conversations with members have put forth a suggestion to use the senior bus at night to bring the seniors out as a method to increase socialization. In response to many requests for memorialization, the Council is looking into a program in conjunction with Shade Tree Commission that would include an area along the Passaic River. Information will be disseminated once finalization of details has occurred.

At this time, Mayor Damiano briefly discussed the Zoom meeting with the Girl Scouts referenced previously, and the projects the Township has worked on.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, it was moved by Councilmember Vancheri, seconded by Councilmember Hablitz, that the meeting be and it was adjourned at 7:49 p.m.
