- December, 2019: CHD monitors COVID-19 situation, participates in daily CDC and NJDOH conference calls
- ► February 10, 2020: First COVID-19 correspondence sent to Little Falls administration
- March 5, 2020: First COVID-19 Update Meeting with Little Falls administration, Department heads, and school officials
- March 9, 2020: Governor declares state of emergency and a public health emergency
- March 12, 2020: First COVID-19 case received in the City of Clifton







- March 17, 2020: Second COVID-19 Update Meeting/Forum held at Town Hall; first statement released to the public

- April 19, 2021: Residents 16 and older eligible for vaccination
- June 7, 2021: COVID-19 education and vaccination at Little Falls Farmer's Market
- July 1, 2021: Strengthening Local Public Health Capacity Grant funding used to establish COVID Team/purchase COVID-19 supplies
- July 27, 2021: Meeting with Little Falls School Representatives and School Nurses to discuss safe return to school
- August 9 & August 10, 2021: Pfizer COVID-19 Vaccination Clinics offered at PVHS





- August 14, 2021: CHD begins to offer 3rd doses for immunocompromised individuals
- August 17, 2021: Meeting with Passaic Valley High School representatives to discuss safe return to school
- August 31, 2021: Passaic Valley High School Pfizer Clinic (collaboration with Passaic County Health Department); 39 doses administered.
- November 19, 2021: CDC expands eligibility for COVID-19 booster shots to all adults








Case Investigations

- Types of information gathered:
 - Demographic/contact information
 - Living situation
 - Hospitalization status
 - Symptom information (onset and types of symptoms experienced)
 - Immune suppression/pre-existing conditions
 - Exposures
 - Occupation information
 - Assistance needed (food, housing, social support)

Contact Tracing

- Type of information gathered from close contacts:
 - Relationship to case (i.e. household contact, friend, work colleague, etc.)
 - Type of contact (i.e. household, healthcare, school setting, etc.)
 - Occupation status
 - Last date of contact
 - Any symptoms experienced





Contact Tracing

NOTE TO CI: For contact tracing purposes, a "close contact" is anyone who spent 15 minutes or more within a 24-hour period and was within 6 feet of a person infected with COVID-19 while they were infectious (2 days before onset of symptoms to 10 days after).

NOTE TO CI: Don't forget to register any household/close contacts of the case you are interviewing. This section should be filled out for each contact identified. A contact monitoring form on Commocare must also be filled out for each contact identified. When you register the contact, you must assign the contact to yourself to follow-up. For contact registration purposes, ask the case for the following information:



Isolation Guidelines

Then

- You must self isolate for 10 full days and be fever free for 24 hours AND
- symptoms must have greatly improved AND
- If you are asymptomatic you must still isolate for 10 full days, with day 0 being date tested positive.

Now

If you tested positive for COVID-19 (regardless of vaccination status):

- You should stay home and isolate for at least 5 days
- If you have no symptoms, or if symptoms are resolving after 5 days, you can leave your house but should continue to wear a mask around others for an additional 5 days, avoid travel if possible, and avoid places where you can't wear a mask (i.e. a restaurant)
- If you have a fever, continue to stay home until fever-free for 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medications, and other symptoms improve.

Isolate for 10 days (immunocompromised)

Quarantine Guidelines

Then

- If you are NOT SICK but LIVE WITH SOMEONE who has COVID-19: Stay home and away from the sick person for 14 days.
- If you are caring for someone with COVID-19, or if the sick person cannot be separated from others at home, you should stay home while the sick person is home (at least 10 days) plus 14 more days.
- Close contacts: If you are NOT SICK but had CLOSE CONTACT with a COVID-19 case OR have TRAVELED to an area with high levels of COVID-19: Stay home for 14 days.

Now

If you were exposed to COVID-19 and are not up to date with COVID-19 vaccinations:

- You should stay home and quarantine for 5 days, monitor for symptoms, and get tested at least 5 days after exposure.
- After ending quarantine, for 5 additional days, you should wear a mask around others, delay travel, avoid persons at high-risk for severe illness, and avoid places where you can't wear a mask.












Little Falls Confirmed COVID-19 Cases by Age and Gender



Little Falls Confirmed COVID-19 Cases by Gender (As of 8/3/2022 11:00AM)






Little Falls COVID-19 Metrics as of 8/3/2022






Little Falls Confirmed COVID-19 Cases by Race and Ethnicity



Monkeypox Updates and Information







About Monkeypox

- The Monkeypox virus is part of the same family of viruses as variola virus, the virus that causes smallpox
- Discovered in 1958 when two outbreaks of a pox-like disease occurred in colonies of monkeys kept for research; first human case occurred in 1970
- Prior to the current outbreak/global public health emergency, monkeypox had been reported in several central and western African countries
- Symptoms of monkeypox can include: fever, headache, muscle aches and backache, swollen lymph nodes, chills, exhaustion, respiratory symptoms (e.g. sore throat, nasal congestion, or cough), a rash that may be located on or near the genitals, but could also be on other areas like the hands, feet, chest, face, or mouth.




Monkeypox Transmission

- Currently, risk to the public is low
- Can spread to anyone through close, personal, often skin-to-skin contact, including:
 - Direct contact with monkeypox rash, scabs, or body fluids from a person with monkeypox
 - Touching objects, fabrics (clothing, bedding, or towels), and surfaces that have been used by someone with monkeypox
 - Contact with respiratory droplets
- •This direct contact can happen during intimate contact, including:
 - Oral, anal, and vaginal sex or touching the genitals of a person with monkeypox
 - Hugging, massage, and kissing
 - Prolonged face-to-face contact
 - Touching fabrics and objects during sex that were used by a person with monkeypox and that have not been disinfected
- A pregnant person can spread the virus to their fetus through the placenta







Monkeypox Prevention

- Avoid close, skin-to-skin contact with people who have a rash that looks like monkeypox
 - Do not touch the rash or scabs of a person with monkeypox
 - Do not kiss, hug, cuddle or have sex with someone with monkeypox
- Avoid contact with objects and materials that a person with monkeypox has used
 - Do not share eating utensils or cups with a person with monkeypox
 - Do not handle or touch the bedding, towels, or clothing of a person with monkeypox
- Wash your hands often with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer, especially before eating or touching your face and after you use the bathroom





Monkeypox Exposure

- Isolate as soon as symptoms appear
- Wear a well-fitted mask if you have to go out, especially when in prolonged, close proximity with others
- Avoid close contact, including sexual or intimate contact, with anyone until you have been seen by a health care provider
- If you start to notice lesions, contact your doctor or your local urgent care facility for testing
- Rashes on the body should be covered with long sleeves or pants to avoid touching other people
- Call healthcare provider ahead of time







Vaccine Eligibility

- People who have known contact with someone who tested positive for orthopoxvirus or monkeypox virus within the past 14 days
- People who attended an event where known monkeypox exposure occurred within the past 14 days
- People who identify as gay, bisexual, or men who have sex with men and/or transgender, gender non-conforming, or gender non-binary and who have a history of multiple or anonymous sex partners within the past 14 days
- *New Jersey is expecting additional doses from CDC and as the State gets additional supply the Department will continue to expand access to the vaccine.



Spotted Lanternfly

What to do:

If you see egg masses, scrape them off, double bag and throw away. You can also place the eggs into alcohol, bleach or hand sanitizer to kill them.

Collect a specimen:

Specimens of any life stage can be turned in to the New Jersey Department of Agriculture's lab for verification.

Take a picture:

With your GPS function turned on your smartphone or a camera with GPS, take a photograph of **ANY** life stage (including egg masses)

Report a site:

If you can't take a specimen or photograph, call and leave detailing your sighting and contact information.


